Benefits

- Intentional teaching allows children to become aware of rules regarding fire, and how to navigate this safely
- Children can engage as little or as much as they would like whilst realising assessing their own risk level.
- Numeracy skills, language opportunity and fine motor can be incorporated with setting up, lighting and keeping the fire going.
- Children can become involved in filling up the water bottle for example opening opportunities for discussion.
- A relaxed atmosphere promotes ideal setting for storytelling, reading stories, listening skills, concentration skills.
- Children can sit in a variety of social situations, eat snack, communicate, and build bonds.
- Children feel a sense of achievement after practicing lighting a flint light the fire.
- Staff may take the firepit to other outdoor locations the children are familiar with which re-enforces their sense of self and pride in their community.
- Staff can train others on the use of firepits and fire bowls bringing a sense of confidence to practitioners.
